

**COUNCIL MINUTES  
CITY OF PARKER REGULAR MEETING  
Monday, February 8, 2021 7:00 p.m.**

The Parker City Council met in regular session on Monday, January 11, 2021 in the council room of City Hall. Members present: Council members: Harms, Nogelmeier Herlyn, Erickson, Schulte, and Mayor Nelson. Council President Berens arrived at 7:49 p.m. Other persons attending: Finance Officer Jans, Mike Jorgensen, Sarah Ebeling, Kathy Rand, Sheriff Luke, JT Silvernail, Dr. Donovan DeBoer, Jim Vogel, Jason Chester, Ransom Jones and Chris Brockevelt. Mayor Nelson declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

All action in following minutes carried by unanimous vote unless otherwise stated.

- 21.09 Motion by Harms, seconded by Nogelmeier to approve the January 11, 2021 meeting minutes as presented. Motion carried.
- 21.10 Motion by Erickson, seconded by Herlyn to approve the February claims as presented, and to include Vast Broadband, Staples, East River and PCC. List attached. Motion carried. January salaries: General Fund: \$25,441.64. Enterprise Funds: \$10,512.99. TOTAL: \$35,954.63.
- 21.11 Motion by Nogelmeier, seconded by Harms to aid in the cost of the water connection at Twisted Pines Venue for the amount of a one-inch water line and supplies. All votes yes with Schulte abstaining from vote. Motion carried.

**ORDINANCE 7.0501  
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 7.0501  
Parking Prohibited in Certain Places**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARKER, SOUTH DAKOTA:**  
That Section 7.0501 of the Parker City Ordinances is hereby amended and shall read as follows:

- 7.0501 Parking Prohibited in Certain Places. At any time it shall be unlawful to permit any vehicle to stop, stand or park in any of the following places, except where necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a law enforcement officer or traffic control sign or signal:
- A. Within an intersection;
  - B. On a crosswalk;
  - C. Within fifteen feet of a fire hydrant;
  - D. In front of a private driveway;
  - E. Within fifteen feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station or EMS building, or directly across the street from such entrance, except personal vehicles of emergency personnel;
  - F. On a sidewalk;
  - G. Within fifteen feet of inside boundary line of the sidewalk, or if no sidewalk is in place, within twenty-five feet of the intersecting roadway, except that this provision shall not apply to alleys;
  - H. Parking against direction of traffic on through streets;
  - I. Parking of any vehicle or recreation vehicle on any City street, alley, property owned by the City, or private property for the purpose of camping, sleeping, or lodging. Such lodging shall only take place in approved recreational vehicle parks.
  - J. No person shall park any recreational vehicle on any street within the City for a period longer than forty-eight (48) hours. Recreational vehicle(s) shall be tagged by a law enforcement officer and a warning issued to remove within forty-eight (48) hours. Failure to do so will result in removal by the City at the owner's expense. For purposes of this Section, recreational vehicle is defined to include, but shall not be limited to, the following:
    - 1. Cargo trailers;
    - 2. Travel trailers;
    - 3. Pickup campers or coaches;
    - 4. Motorhomes;
    - 5. Camping trailers;
    - 6. Boats and boat trailers;
    - 7. Snowmobiles and snowmobile trailers;
    - 8. Jet skis and jet ski trailers;
    - 9. Golf carts and golf cart trailers;
    - 10. All-terrain vehicles and all-terrain vehicle trailers;
    - 11. Dirt bikes and dirt bike trailers; and
    - 12. Any other recreational equipment or cases, boxes or items used to store or transport such recreational equipment.

Department Reports: Sheriff Luke was present to give a recap of 2020 and to answer any questions. Mayor Nelson discussed with Luke that the only trouble we have right now is the snow alerts are not getting taken care of. Library Director Rand gave an update and asked for approval of two new board members.

- 21.18 Motion by Schulte, seconded by Nogelmeier to approve Monica Christensen and Lajeane Smith as Library Board Trustees. Motion carried.

Street Superintendent gave an update regarding the last two snow events. Finance Officer Jans reminded the council of the March 15, 2021 local board assessment hearing at 7 p.m. and the District Meeting on March 18, 2021 at 5:30 p.m. Jans also gave an update regarding Phase 6 Utility Improvement upgrade and discussed possible summer basketball program that would utilize the outdoor court by the pool.

- 21.19 Motion by Schulte, seconded by Erickson to go into Executive Session at 7:40 p.m. for the purpose of discussing personnel, consult with legal counsel, and other matters in accordance to SDCL 1-25-2. Motion carried.

Mayor Nelson requested to let the record show Sarah Ebeling, Managing Editor of The New Era objects to the executive session.

Mayor Nelson declared out of executive session at 7:55 p.m.

Dr. Donovan DeBoer, Jim Vogel, Jason Chester, Ransom Jones, all representatives from Parker School and Chris Brockevelt from Koch-Hazard Architects were present to discuss the school addition and proposed parking situation. After discussion Mayor Nelson and council assured DeBoer the City would help with the boulevard removal and street resurfacing.
